



**NOTE:** Wild rabbit mothers only visit the nest twice a day. If you find healthy, uninjured babies in a nest without their mother, they are fine and should be left alone.



- If you've accidentally used a lawn mower over a rabbit nest, or if a dog or cat had a baby rabbit in it's mouth, immediately place the baby in a box with an external heat source and bring it to one of our drop off locations.
  - If you've found an uninjured baby rabbit, and it is smaller than a baseball, attempt to find its nest and replace it. See the guide here: CLICK HERE
  - If the nest can't be located, or the mother rabbit does not come back by the next morning, place the baby in a box with an external heat source and bring it to one of our drop off locations.

## **KEEP IN MIND**

- Baby rabbits are extremely fragile and even being overstressed can cause death. Keep baby rabbits in a quiet, dark place and only handle them as much as necessary to get them to a licensed wildlife rehabilitator.

Your scent on the baby will not make the mother abandon a baby.

Never feed a baby rabbit anything, not even Pedialyte. If their eyes are open, you can offer a small dish of water.
